The "real boaters" were at the Beaver release or their favorite creek after the Floyd induced deluge. I'm sure they had fun but they missed some great water on the Lehigh.

Saturday on Lehigh Section 3 was awesome after Floyd. It was a bright, clear autumn like day for my first trip on Section 3. I found a lone kayaker at the Lower Gorge Rockport put in at 9:30 AM. Jim Heyer was a former rafting guide and kayaked the Lehigh in the early 80's at 15,000 cfs. He is much saner now and

sells long term care insurance. We tagged along with his brother who was a safety boater and their rafting wives on a raft trip to Jim Thorpe.

The release was 1,200 CFS but shut down at noon Saturday. Flow was 2000+ at Rockport and was really ripping after Drake's Creeks kicked in at the first bend. We made the 15-mile trip with the rafts in 4 hours with a 45-minute lunch. We did avail ourselves of numerous surfing opportunities in the big waves and holes; but with the high water

there were not many broached rafts or swimmers, so we had as much play time as we wanted. Rapids were bodacious and long. Pipeline was the best; 1/2 mile of continuous 6-8 foot wave train with embedded holes. I towed a flipped canoeist out the bottom of the rapid. It was like towing a battleship. Flow was 3000+ at the take out. Needle's Eye was partially washed out, the smaller rock on right was pillowed. The Boulder Garden was pretty well washed out. Met Tom (OC-1), and kayakers Mike, Josie, Bob, Holly, and Jeff from Harrisburg & York clubs at Hickory Run campsite Saturday night and boated with them Sunday. There was no Sunday release and Rockport put in was down to 500 cfs.

After much consultation we headed for Nescopeck Creek about 20 miles west of White Haven near intersection of I80 and I81, because she holds her water well. We knew we had found the right place when there were 6 vehicles at the put in. A boater at the take out on the shuttle reported no new strainers, he didn't tell us about all the old ones. We road scouted the 3 foot drop 200 yards below the iron bridge at 3 miles on the shuttle. A 15-foot high midstream rock split the flow below the drop into 2 chutes. We didn't see a potential pin if you took the drop river left instead of down the obvious center tongue. Four of the party had made the 5 mile run before so we ran it with boat scouting and "logs". The "log" took the tongue below the iron bridge and spotted the pin from the river left eddy and signaled the safe route.

The Nescopeck is a delightful ledge drop creek with numerous 2-4 foot drops, eddies, surfing waves, and holes for play spots. It required lots of maneuvering to avoid strainers and holes and run chutes. Scenery was spectacular. It is rated Class 1 to 3-, but with the maneuvering and a couple of holes that tended to "keep" some boats and a 35 foot/mile gradient for the 5 mile run (27 feet/mile for 8.4 mile) it is a pretty technical class 3. The stream is 60 feet wide and flows through farmland and a tree lined gorge

with overhanging trees and rocks. Often the shoreline is a thicket of mountain laurel. A road runs along the rim of the gorge for shuttle and emergencies but is almost invisible. A camp at 4 miles on river left and the bridges are only cultural intrusions.

Overall a great trip with new boating friends. One surprise I fortunately didn't find out about until a mile from the take out was that Josie, who is a deputy Medical Examiner, had 2 body bags in her car. That was a real confidence builder!

More Definitions (in case you didn't know...)

Canoeist -- A.K.A. "open boater." Anyone who paddles an open canoe. Tandem canoeists are known for their constant, loud repartee concerning whose fault it was that the boat got flipped. Solo canoeists are well-known for their smug attitudes regarding all decked boaters, particularly kayakers. Recognized by their total lack of fear when swimming in Class V water. Usually heard saying, "shit, that's easy with two blades." Thought of as being obnoxious and demented by most kayakers, open boaters are useful in river rescues when not being rescued themselves. Even though canoes can run anything a decked boat can (despite what they think out West), open boaters are very insecure about the capabilities of their chosen river craft. It is the scared duty of all kayakers to tease canoeists.

C-boater -- Possibly the most butch of all whitewater personality types, C-boaters think all other boaters are wimps, period. Kayakers are considered to be beneath contempt. When not crawling around on hands and knees at the takeout sobbing, "my ankles...my knees...." they can be observed ice-picking unattended kayaks in the parking area. Non C-boaters consider C-boaters to be a misguided and masochistic lot.

Kayaker -- "Yak jockey," "river maggot;" In the words of an open-boater friend of mine . . . "twice the paddle, half the man," kayakers are perceived by non-kayakers as: (1) the watery equivalent of Hell's Angels; or (2) brain-damaged river loonies, or both. Easily recognized on the river for their penchant for traveling in large, loud groups and surfing every wave or hole on the river no matter how small. Kayakers have a reputation for peeling out in front of canoes and rafts, getting run over by canoes, rafts and other kayakers while surfing holes, and/or mooning rafters and open boaters. Kayakers view all other types of river craft as slow-moving impediments to wave and hole playing. Canoeists are

occasionally tolerated by kayakers for their entertainment value when they perform canoe crash and burns in every other rapid. Decked canoeists (particularly C-1 paddlers) are tolerated by kayakers primarily for their verbal abuse value if they eat it in front of the kayakers.
