Waterline Is Free!

You're cruising around the nation with your boat on top of your car looking for water. But wait — instead of wasting gas and time, let your fingers do the walking and give Waterline a call.

What is Waterline? Waterline is a national telephone hotline that gives current river stage information for hundreds of river gauge and release sites in the United States. Flow information is available for a number of sites as well. Waterline is totally automated and is the largest single telephone source of river level and flow information in the United States.

Waterline operates 24 hours a day, 365 days per year. Most Waterline reports are updated 6 to 24 times per day with satellite data directly from the gauges. Waterline is incredibly fast and simple to use. Just call the 800 report number of your choice, enter the six digit code for the site you want and listen to the report. You can interrupt any report with another site code any time you have heard enough of any report. The site codes and additional information are available on the Web at www.h2oline.com or by calling Waterline Customer Service at (800) 945-3376 during normal business hours, Eastern Time.

There are two toll-free waterline numbers. The Waterline Fishing Edition (800) 452-1742 includes locations and sponsors of interest to anglers, and the Waterline Boater's Edition (800) 452-1737 includes locations and sponsors of interest to the paddlers and floaters.

Up until several months ago Waterline used a fee for service model. Now, however, they are providing the service to the public for free, and are in the process of finding sponsors to offset the cost. Since they began offering the service for free, they have seen a dramatic increase in usage. During last year's boating season, they received over 30,000 calls from 9 states for the Salmon River (NY) alone! If you or your business decide to sponsor a river, listeners will hear a brief message from you at the beginning of each call. For more information, contact Waterline sales at (800) 747-1667.

Liability Laws And Recreational Use Statutes In Easy Access Format

If you've spent much time playing outside, you've probably asked a landowner at least once or twice for permission to access a favorite trail, river, climbing wall, hunting area, or fishing hole on their property. Most of these encounters start with variations on a familiar script:

"Hi, I'm looking for the owner of this beautiful piece of God's green earth."

"Well, that's me, it's been in my family since the '30s."

"Wow, that's great. Hey, would you mind if I park over by the woods and do a little exploring?"

This is when the script can break down and the landowner either answers, "Sure, no problem. Just be careful, wouldn't want you to get hurt," or "I'm not sure. What if you get hurt? My lawyer's warned me about letting folks on the property."

If you were lucky, you got the first response and spent the day burning calories. If you weren't as lucky, you got the latter response, which was less of a question and more of a statement leading to "No, go away." If you got the soft shoulder, you could have responded with, "I plan on being careful, don't worry about me," or "Okay, guess I'll head up the road and try somewhere else." Regardless, your options were limited since there seemed to be more reasons for landowners to deny recreational access than to support it.

In fact, the fear of lawsuits has often been enough to prevent landowners from opening their land to recreation — even when they had no personal aversion to sharing their land with the public. That's why all 50 states have now developed Recreational Use Statutes. These statutes are intended to promote recreation on private lands by reducing landowner liability concerns. The effect has been increased recreational access for canoers, kayakers, mountain bikers, hikers, climbers, skiers, horseback riders, hunters, fishermen, and others.

Now, with assistance from the International Mountain Biking Association (IMBA) and the American Association of Horsemanship Safety (AAHS), American Whitewater has made it even easier for recreationists and landowners to work out access arrangements.

American Whitewater has surveyed and compiled the recreational use statutes for all 50 states with side-by-side comparisons of these laws in an easy to read table at www.americanwhitewater/access/.

The table at this link answers the most common questions for each of the 50 states:

- Is the owner responsible if someone gets hurt on their land?
- Can the owner be sued?
- Does the owner have to guarantee that their property is safe, or does the owner have a duty to warn if there is a known hazard?
- Is the owner's liability protection lost if the owner charges recreational visitors an access fee?

In addition to answering these common questions, our site collects all 50 state recreational use statutes, provides links to additional sources of information, and contrasts differences between the states.

By providing tools and helping to educate recreationists and landowners about their legal rights and protections American Whitewater hopes to encourage more landowners to say those magic words, "Sure it's fine to visit. Take care of yourself and have a great time!"




Everyone is welcome — sellers, buyers, members, and nonmembers. We'll have a fire and good company. And did we mention the free donuts and coffee?
