

September 2001 marks the Fifth Anniversary of FLOWlines

Thanks to the efforts of past newsletter editors Dan Bogaard and Heather Mummery, all back issues of FLOWlines are now available on the web site.

Since I am a relatively new FLOW member, I asked the folks who have been here from the start to write retrospectives on FLOW.

I write this from my unique perspective. After many years paddling in the Rochester area, the memories of paddling whitewater since 1966 are still vivid. Back in high school we did Oatka Creek and Black Creek in aluminum Grumman canoes. Twice in two years I folded a borrowed (my first boss's) canoe around the Oatka railroad trestle! And every April we looked forward to participating in the Canandaigua Outlet race.

It wasn't until 1981 that I took a kayak class. I bought one of the first plastic kayaks imported from Canada by John Robertson. This was long before the Perception Mirage and Dancers came on the scene! At that time there were so few of us that we knew every boater between Buffalo and the Hudson River by kayak color and shuttle vehicle. Even today, when I get to the junction of the Indian and Hudson Rivers, I still expect to smell the acrid aroma of quick-setting epoxy fiberglass patches. It is with this perspective that I offer my views on the first Five Years of FLOW.

From the 1950's until the early 1990's Genesee Valley Chapter of the Adirondak Mountain Club (GVC-ADK) was the logical place for whitewater boaters to meet and plan outings. GVC-ADK had many whitewater outings (172 paddling days in just one year). "Kids" were always encouraged to come along, and many paddlers brought and trained their children on those outings. The Christmas party was always at the paddlers home who had the biggest house (Paul). GVC-ADK sponsored one of the few pool practices to be found in western NY. Another pool practice was held at the University of Rochester, which had impressive

kayak racing and rowing teams. So Rochester has always had a concentration of paddlers.

Aspiring canoeists thought that there were not enough flat water and canoe trips scheduled. Try as we might to involve "flat water paddlers", canoeists were a different breed. Their outings were usually limited to a couple of canoes quietly enjoying the serenity, so major canoe trips were nearly impossible to schedule. This was contrary to the typical frenzy of whitewater, where an attitude of "the more the merrier" attitude prevails. These disparities led to a perceived dissent among the growing paddling community. To complicate things further, the terms LIABILITY and WAIVER were surfacing. To organizations *liability* and *whitewater* were synonymous.

There were suggestions made that whitewater boaters should consider forming a separate whitewater club. Finally a few farsighted and perhaps discouraged paddlers did just that. And Finger Lakes Ontario Whitewater was born. My only reservation was FLOW is already used by FLOW of New England (of Deerfield River fame).

Rather than actively assist as a charter member, I chose to step aside to devote my time to ADK waterways as they were the our primary instrument through which we achieved and maintained Salmon Releases. And I maintained my allegiance to American Whitewater and New York Rivers United which are also highly involved in NY hydro re-licensing activities. In addition, I wasted no time joining the newly formed FLOW.

Local paddling organizations such as FLOW are better than national or state organizations in taking care of business in their own backyard. But clubs come and clubs go. The recent and very disappointing demise of CNY whitewater club is one example. This was one example of too few people doing the work. FLOW follows a common scheme of volunteerism where a few do the majority of the work. The future of FLOW is based on individual involvement. I see a renewed commitment to formally organizing the sport of paddling. Everyone from retirees to young people are once again getting involved and it's very refreshing. It has been decades since I have seen so many paddlers paddling with families and children. And sea-kayaking and rowing experts have stepped up to round out the knowledge base.

A word of caution: burnout can take its toll in any volunteer organizations. I am grateful for the founding fathers and to the Steering Committee that gives its time to keep us knit together. In addition, some of our gratitude should go to other volunteers such as Karen Alexander who added much then moved on.



The newest venture, Lock 32, provides another example to prove Rochester is still a premier place for whitewater paddlers to learn, train, and remain organized. *Happy Birthday FLOW!*

FLOW was founded five years ago, in the summer 1996 as an outgrowth of the Whitewater Committee of the Genesee Watersports Center, which I helped found back in 1993. The Whitewater Committee had been exploring avenues to develop paddlesports in the Rochester area, partially motivated by the concept of a whitewater park downtown. But Rick Williams conceived of and fostered the idea of a whitewater park at Lock 32. At our June 1996 meeting we arrived at the idea that a full-service paddling club in the area was needed, partly to back the Lock 32 development, and partly to offer a full range of services to the paddling community, whether whitewater, flatwater or racing. Mike Shafer was our first elected officer...treasurer, and he collected the first dues check at the July 1996 meeting. Perry Vayo was chartered to come up with some choices for names, and one of his candidates, F.L.O.W., was the hands-down favorite. The first brief newsletter appeared in September 1996 carrying the name FLOWLINES. The rest is history.

I think it was in 1994 or 1995 that I first saw a newspaper article about a possible whitewater course in downtown Rochester. The article solicited people for input and volunteerism. It was through the Rochester Watersports Center and the contact name was Steve Kittleberger. I called on Steve, attended a meeting and started to get involved. The Rochester Watersports Center is now the Genesee Waterways Center. Steve and I spoke at the meetings and GWC was the parent group which a paddling club would fall under. Steve, Ardie Shaffer, and some others (can't remember them all) started talking about setting up a club for paddlers. The ADK was the only club around at that point that had paddling associated with it but was not geared at all for paddlers and there was no

support or structure. The loose knit community of paddlers came to the consensus that a club for networking and information was needed.

Initial meetings were held at the GWC boathouse and after a few gatherings it was evident that a club was needed. I remember a meeting where we threw out some names. We wanted to be broad enough to include greater Rochester and nearby counties/region. The task was to come up with an appropriate name which also had a cool acronym. Perry Vayo came to the next meeting and had three or so possibilities. Everyone liked FLOW and hence the name, club and path we're on was born. Instead of the pipedream downtown whitewater course, I embarked on a mission to try to create a facility at lock 32 for a fraction of the cost. At this time a legal entity was needed. Liking the idea of a non-for-profit entity, GWC (formerly RWC) was the likely choice since this was to be the overlap of FLOW as the GWC paddling branch. In the process I had to apply for a for-profit to get the initial permits and then merge back into the non-profit GWC to run the facility.

My hope is that the original concepts of FLOW and GWC take place, where GWC is the non-profit instructional, educational and training arm that FLOW members benefit from.
